Part of the magic of Lower Manhattan is being surroundedon all sides by water. The beauty of the Statue of Liberty and our harbor continually inspires me and countless other New Yorkers. From our country's founding through today, our waterfront is one of the main reasons we have been a critical economic engine for the region and the capital of global finance for hundreds of years.

That is why I was heartened to

see Mayor de Blasio touting our economic and historical importance recently while announcing the release of his Lower Manhattan Climate Resilience Study. And more importantly, some plans to deal with global warming and rising tides. To that end, the mayor announced \$500 million in funding for four capital projects to reinforce the neighborhood's coastal areas.

The mayor also announced that the city will spend the next two years developing a resilience master plan for the Financial District and Seaport. Among the options under consideration include extending the East River shoreline. These projects will be costly and perhaps controversial. But I look forward to learning more and working with our stakeholders and elected officials as his administration engages the community to explore feasible options to mitigate the long-term impacts of climate change. Stay tuned.

ALLIANCE RELEASES RESIDENTIAL WASTE GUIDE

With 62,000 people living downtown, Lower Manhattan's population has tripled since 9/11. More people means more residential garbage. To reduce the amount of garbage put on streets, the Alliance released

the Lower Manhattan Residential Sanitation Resource Guide for Residents and Property Managers in March. The guide includes tips on recycling and diverting other materials from the waste stream, inexpensive strategies for reducing sidewalk refuse and long-term policy recommendations for the Department of Sanitation. 1K HEALTHCARE & NONPROFITS Call Lower Manhattan Home

More than 1,000 healthcare companies and nonprofits call Lower Manhattan home. The Alliance's recently released *Healthcare and*

LOWER MANHATTAN TOPS PRE-9/11 JOB NUMBERS

Lower Manhattan's private sector employment hit a historic milestone in the first quarter of 2019. The neighborhood's 251,000 jobs represent the first time the total has exceeded the job numbers before the September

11th attacks. This growth was driven by vigorous leasing activity for both renewals and relocations. Year-over-year, private sector employment grew four percent.


We hear you are a fan of live music. Have you seen any good shows recently?
