

LOWER MANHATTAN CELEBRATES WOMEN'S WORLD CUP CHAMPIONSHIP

The United States Women's National Soccer Team celebrated their second World Cup in a row with a ticker-tape parade on July 10, 2019. With their 2-0 defeat of the Netherlands in the Finals, the U.S. won their fourth championship in Women's World Cup history. Fans lined Broadway as Megan Rapinoe, Alex Morgan and Rose Lavalle led the team to City Hall where Mayor de Blasio gave players keys to the city.

DID YOU KNOW?...In August of 1775, the Hearts of Oak, a volunteer militia that included students from what is now Columbia University, were part of a successful raid that seized British cannons from the Battery. Then-college student Alexander Hamilton was a member of the militia.

It has been an exciting few weeks in Lower Manhattan. Last month, as the city hosted World Pride, here at the Alliance, we took the time to look back at the neighborhood's role in LGBTQ history. *Queer All Along*, a short history of LGBTQ life in Lower Manhattan surveyed how everyone from Walt Whitman, early gay rights pioneer Henry Gerber and the AIDS activists of the 1980s shaped queer experience in Manhattan's oldest neighborhood.

We also wanted to showcase just how diverse and welcoming the neighborhood is today. To do that, we partnered with three LGBTQ influencers for our Be Seen video campaign where they shared why they think Lower Manhattan is one

of the city's most inclusive and interesting neighborhoods. Over at LMHQ, its June Women's Breakfast focused on how to implement necessary policies and steps to achieve workplace equality. And during World Pride weekend, the Alliance joined forces with Virgin Atlantic for a celebrity-studded pride celebration at One World Observatory.

Speaking of incredible parties, Lower Manhattan was the site of July's ticker-tape parade celebrating the U.S. Women's Soccer Team's World Cup championship. Some 300,000 New Yorkers came out and showered the team with a couple tons of shredded paper and confetti during New York's 207th ticker-tape parade.

And while Labor Day and back-to-school plans might feel as if they are right around the corner, there is still time to make the most of your summer right here in Lower Manhattan.

Two critically-acclaimed restaurants recently opened. Jean-Georges Vongerichten's The Fulton, on the ground floor of Pier 17 is the Michelin-starred chef's first seafood restaurant. At 70 Pine Street is Crown Shy which comes from the forces behind Eleven Madison Park and NoMad.

Summer is also a great time to find out why Lower Manhattan is home to some of the city's best green space.

Just a short ferry ride away is Governors Island - Lower Manhattan's backyard. Explore the island by bike, hop a ride on a 300 foot-long zipline or take a rest on one of the island's oversized hammocks. The island also features art exhibits and workshops from Pioneer Works and the Yale School of Architecture. And if you want to go camping but don't want to leave the city, Collective Retreats gives you the chance to "glamp" it up in one of their Governors Island tents. Our waterfront also provides endless opportunities to enjoy the summer. There are concerts and workout classes at Pier 17, the greenways on the East and Hudson rivers are perfect for a run or bike ride, the Seaglass Carousel at The Battery is always a delight for young and old or you can stretch out and enjoy the sea breeze at The Battery's Woodlands.

Whether it's a little R&R on Governors Island, a night out at one of our new hit restaurants or a stroll on one of our greenways, the neighborhood is truly your oyster this summer in Lower Manhattan.

A NEW WAY TO GET UP CLOSE & PERSONAL WITH LADY LIBERTY


New York's newest museum is now open to the public on Liberty Island. Clocking in at 26,000 square feet, the Statue of Liberty Museum features an immersive theater, panoramic views of the statue and its original torch. While Lady Liberty is known the world over as a symbol of freedom, the museum explores the statue creator's intent to commemorate America's abolition of slavery. The museum also highlights how the statue came to be associated with immigration; how universal liberty is far from a reality; and the statue's global impact.

MEMORIAL GLADE OPENS AT THE 9/11 MEMORIAL & MUSEUM



The 9/11 Memorial & Museum unveiled the Memorial Glade in late May. Opened to the public on the 17th anniversary of the end of recovery efforts at Ground Zero, the Glade honors the sacrifice of those who have fallen ill or died in the wake of the 9/11 attacks. The installation features six stone monoliths that range in weight from

 $13 \mbox{ to } 18 \mbox{ tons and inlaid with steel from the World Trade Center.}$




YOU SCREAM, I SCREAM, WE ALL SCREAM FOR MORE WI-FI

QUESTION & ANSWER



Kamau created The Black Gotham Experience in 2010 to bring to life the history of the African Diaspora in New York City. His work includes public talks, graphic novels and walking tours through the Financial District.

Tell us about the inspiration for Black Gotham Experience.

Black Gotham Experience was inspired by the question of a middle school Black girl in 2008. She listened to me give a 90 minute tour at a museum in the Lower East Side about Germanlewish and Italian families then raised her hand at the end of the tour and asked a life-changing question. "Where were the Black people?" Until that moment, I was not conscious of how much the Black narrative had profound gaps in the collective consciousness and the story of New York City. Black people are not fully visible until the Harlem Renaissance, but have been on the island almost a full 300 years before 1920. Her question, innocence and power literally moved me to create the Black Gotham Experience and has been my north star ever since. My work answers the question of a child. Here are the Black people.

Lower Manhattan is New York City's oldest neighborhood. The story of the African-American experience is in many ways synonymous with the growth of New York. What do most people not understand about that relationship?

For one, it is important to not think of people of African descent or Black

people before the creation of the United States of America as African-American. People of African descent have been present on this island before New Amsterdam was founded in 1624 and had established a farming community before the creation of New York City that started in 1643. They would have been considered from specific countries such as the Congo or Angola. The term American has had a variety of meanings from the 17th to 19th century. African-American is a late 20th century concept.

Is there one figure of the African diaspora in New York City history that you believe more people should know about?

That is super tough but I will go with Sarah who was involved in the 1712 rebellion in New York City at Broadway and Maiden Lane. Women's stories have been redacted similarly as Black stories and she unites these two invisible worlds we move through every day as New Yorkers. New York City would not be as cool, wealthy, or free without the ideas and labor of Black people and women but the public square and collective consciousness of our city does not reflect this fact.

What's the future hold for the Black Gotham Experience?

Creating more media that illustrates the expansive epic of the African Diaspora and the much needed updates to the public square to inform, entertain and enlighten passersby. And more partnerships with institutions within New York City and throughout the world that connects the stories of the Black Diaspora so people have an atlas they can follow and experience.


You spend a lot of time in Lower Manhattan. What are some of your favorite spots (to visit/eat at/drink at) while in the neighborhood?

I love the water so nothing beats a walk to Pier 17 to drink in the scene and get out of my head.

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
