The coming months are packed with exciting events—part of the Downtown Alliance's effort to make sure Lower Manhattan is *the* location of choice for living, working and playing.

We're particularly pleased to introduce our vision for Greenwich South—the district bordered by West Street, Broadway, Battery Park and the World Trade Center site. When Greenwich Street is reconnected through the World Trade Center superblock, Greenwich South has the potential to become an anchor neighborhood for Downtown. What does that mean? Imagine a series of arts and creative districts that begin near Battery Park and continue up Greenwich Street toward the West Village. Imagine vibrant blocks of shops, skyscrapers and open spaces that offer dramatically improved access between Battery Park City and the Financial District. And this is only the beginning.

We will display highlights of our plan in Zuccotti Park starting on September 29, and we invite residents and workers to visit the exhibit and share their comments and advice.

This fall will also see welcome progress toward opening 400,000 square feet of new school space for Downtown's growing residential population. The first of four new schools in the pipeline is scheduled to open in 2010.

As Lower Manhattan's many restaurants and retailers prepare for the change of season, this issue showcases some of the newest members of our business community. The Downtown Alliance again will support our local establishments with a comprehensive holiday retail campaign. And be sure to follow us on *Twitter*, where you'll be notified of chances to win free prizes at area merchants!

This is a wonderful time of year in Lower Manhattan and the perfect opportunity to enjoy some simple pleasures and a wide variety of outdoor activities. MOVING FORWARD

- The steamy summer is giving way to cooler days, and the Downtown Alliance is revving up for the holidays. Last year's Holiday Shopping Downtown campaign saturated the neighborhood with visually-stimulating advertisements and practical shopping guides. This year, Holiday Shopping Downtown will be bigger and better, with a major holiday event for Downtown residents, workers and visitors. - The Downtown Alliance's free Bike Around Downtown program is gearing down from another busy season. Over 5,000 riders have already taken advantage of this summer program at Pier 17. The 2009 season ends on September 30, so make your reservations now at DowntownNY.com/bikearound.
- Back to school! Education officials are responding to the growing Downtown residential population with four new leases totaling 400,000 square feet to accommodate schools:

PS/IS 276 in Battery Park City is expected to be ready for its first class in the fall of 2010.

Forest City Ratner's Beekman Tower will also house a school at 8 Spruce Street, and is scheduled for completion in 2010.

The School Construction Authority signed two leases at 26 Broadway totaling 183,200 square feet.

Claremont Preparatory School signed a lease at 25 Broadway for 163,900 square feet.

TRANSFORMING CONSTRUCTION AND TURNING HEADS

Construction in Downtown is always a good sign, but it's not always a great sight. That's why the Downtown Alliance introduced the ground breaking Re:Construction program to transform construction sites into public art displays.

Launched in 2008, Re:Construction is expanding in 2009. As you sprint to work or stroll at lunchtime, keep your eyes peeled for one of the four new works gracing our city streets.

Working with numerous established and up-and-coming artists, we're changing Lower Manhattan construction sites into surprising, innovative open-air galleries. Over the next three years, the Re:Construction project plans to present up to 30 temporary displays that will alter the way Downtown residents, workers and visitors encounter and appreciate new construction — by turning eyesores into eye openers.

GREENWICH SOUTH — WHAT IS IT?

The 41 acres bounded by West Street, the World Trade Center, Broadway and Battery Park — now referred to as Greenwich South — is an area poised to become Lower Manhattan's next great destination. That is the conclusion of a new study conducted by the Downtown Alliance.


The report states that this area, which covers about 20% of Lower Manhattan, represents "an exciting new paradigm — not just for New York but for the prototypical city of the future." And it envisions that Greenwich South can become "a highly charged environment, in which a global business center, an expanding residential community, and a thriving tourist market are woven together into a dense metropolitan fabric."



The study's highlights will be on display beginning
September 29 in Zuccotti Park.
Downtown residents and workers are invited to visit the exhibit and offer suggestions and feedback.

The Downtown Alliance has already begun to improve the quality of life in Greenwich South with new plantings, murals, landscapes, and enhancements to Trinity Park. We are also working with the Department of Transportation to create more bike racks and cyclist accessibility. For more information, visit Greenwich South.net.

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WITH SHAUN HERGATT

We sat down with Shaun Hergatt, Executive Chef at SHO restaurant in the Setai. He told us about his beginnings as a chef, and how Downtown and SHO are the perfect pairing.



Q. What inspired you to become a chef?

A. I learned to love food from a very young age through eating with my family. I trained in my hometown of Cairns [Australia] where I did a four-year apprenticeship. I was taught by predominately European chefs, so I have a very classic French style.
